

reetings from Modanville Public! As I write this article it is the third day of Spring and the temperature is a comfortable 23 degrees. The butterflies are out and the school garden looks beautiful. Our students have had a wonderful term full of varied and exciting opportunities and lots of meaningful classroom learning. The calendar has been action packed which is exactly how we like it. Here is a summary of some of this term's highlights.

As part of our Book week celebrations K-4 went on an excursion to Lismore library.



The children explored this year's book council of Australia books and then went upstairs to participate in the "Brick to Brick" Lego exhibition about Canberra, which is currently touring the country. Our students created some wonderful buildings that they wanted to add to the existing city of Canberra. At the end of Book Week we had a character parade at school where students dressed as their favourite book character.



Term 3 is traditionally a term packed with sporting events. We participated in the Dunoon District Athletics carnival at Riverview Park and had several students go on to compete at Zone and Regional level. Special mention to: Jayden, Lexi, Tameka, Grace, Madelene, Josh, Reid, Mia and Jess who competed at the Regional carnival. We were proud to receive trophies for both



the average and aggregate point score, showing that we had lots of successful students winning and obtaining a place at District level, but more importantly, lots of student who simply participated. We have been focusing on increased participation over the last few years.

In week 7, fifty of our students performed at the Lismore Workers Club as part of the Lismore Performing Arts Festival. This year our students performed a dance called "Robot Revolution". It was an incredibly exciting night with students performing from schools all across the Lismore region. Our students dressed as robots in costumes organised by parents. They looked sensational and enjoyed the experience of performing under lights on the big stage. The excited looks as they left the stage were priceless.

Our school prepared for the Big Scrub Public Speaking Competition at Jiggi Public School in week 8. We had four students represent our school, Levi Borrow and Isabelle Pannach from stage 2 and Bradley Noonan and Grace Carey from stage 3. The students prepared their

speeches and delivered them to an appreciative audience. All students returned with stories about the quality of other students' speeches and ways to improve on their own public speaking. The competition was an excellent opportunity for our students to compete with students from the wider community of schools. We were very proud of our students' performances on the day.

This term has also been a busy one for our chess club. On Tuesday 1st September our school competed in the inaugural Rivers P-12 chess competition. We had

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

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


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DUNOON CHRONICLES WITH DENIS MATTHEWS

y book "Dunoon 2480" went into circulation a month ago and I am delighted to report that it has been met with consider-

able enthusiasm. I have so many people to thank for their support and encouragement the years. Not that the book



decided not to include and since my search for information began in the Land Titles Office, there was a marked emphasis on the various divisions of land. I am afraid there was not much research into the individuals who occupied the various parcels of land.

If you wish to find out more about particular individuals or families, we now have a wonderful resource provided by the National Library of Australia. They call it Trove and it has many aspects. I still find a wealth of information just from newspapers that are readily available on Trove.

My wife's grandfather was head teacher at Bexhill Public school in the 20s and 30s. He was very involved with the Bexhill Public Hall. So was his son, my wife's uncle. Not only was every meeting of the hall committee reported in the "Northern Star", but the various social functions were reported in great detail. If you wish to know what dress your grandmother or your aunts wore to a ball, the chances are you will find it described in considerable detail, at least as far as colour and material. If your relatives were among those who provided the dance music, or sang or recited at functions, then they will figure often.

Of course when I wanted to follow my father's family migrating from Ireland in 1883 on a steamship sailing from the Clyde, I would not find that in the "Northern Star", but it is remarkable how many reports I found in other papers as that ship passed through the Suez Canal and crossed the Indian Ocean in sweltering conditions. It sailed under Krakatoa in the week before that volcano exploded.

Strangely enough the noise of that explosion was heard in South America, but apparently not by the people on board, for the ship had already left Batavia and was sailing round the north of Papua and New Guinea on its way down the east coast of Queensland calling at every port to unload cargo and immigrants. The main ballast of the ship was made up with locomotives and railway rolling stock for the new line running west from Townsville.

If you want to get the most from Trove, do not hesitate to register. If you are logged in you can correct the text that has been digitally scanned. You can see an image of the original paper and read what the text really is. The service needs your input. No scanner can really read old newspaper text as well as you can. Imagine what it makes of a name like Numulgi. Just distinguishing between "m","in" and "ni" is too much for the scanner. As for round letters, they are usually wrong. 'c', 'o 'and 'e' get hopelessly confused.

If you are logged in you can correct some of the errors that occur, being careful of the spelling of names.

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ST. MATTHEW'S ANGLICAN CHURCH NEWS WITH 'GINA MURRAY

unday, 13th September was BACK TO CHURCH SUNDAY, or as we have re-named it, 'COME TO CHURCH SUNDAY', and we had a wonderful day.

Back to Church Sunday began in one Anglican diocese in the United Kingdom in 2005 and since then has spread to all 44 dioceses in Britain and also across other denominations. Back to Church Sunday was launched in Australia on 13th September 2009. 600 churches across 19 Anglican dioceses took part (including St.Matthew's, Dunoon). On that day 12,000 people returned to church at the invitation of a friend.

In 2010, the number of participating churches rose to 660 and an estimated average



of 15 people came back to each church, which represents an increase of 19% for the average congregation size. This year 21,510 churches took part in the initiative, including our little Church of St Matthew's Dunoon. When the first visitor arrived (Kelly Everingham from Modanville – first one there two years in a row) we declared the day an unmitigated success and from there on in it just got better and better.

I should like to thank everyone for coming. I hope you all enjoyed the whole experience – not only the scrumptious morning tea that we all enjoyed after the service.

Come to Church Sunday was rather a sad day for us all too in that we had to say goodbye to one of our long term parishioners Ern Horner. Ern used to live in Modanville and when he and his wife went off travelling they still kept in touch. Unfortunately, Mavis, Erns wife, died a few years ago but Ern continued to travel and when he was in our area he would always come to services in Dunoon, sometimes taking the service himself. He has now, due to ill health, decided to give up the Campervan and settle in a retirement residential facility in Coffs



Harbour. We shall all miss his visits and we wish him all the best for his new path in life. Our next special event will, hopefully, be Remembrance Sunday Service on 8th November when we shall gather to remember those who served, as well as those who died in the major conflicts that our soldiers have been involved in over the years. This is now an annual event on our calendar and is always a very beautiful and touching service. I hope to see you all there.

Multi-faith prayer meeting for the International Day of Peace.

This was held in Lismore on the Saturday afternoon of Sept. 19, hosted by the local Baha'is.

The central purpose of the Baha'i Faith is to help guide humanity closer towards world peace and prosperity. We aim to help spread love and unity across the different races, nations and classes into which the world is still divided. So we're keen to get together with other groups who share our vision of a better safer happier world, and pray together for that.

We invited the local churches and the other peace-focussed groups to meet us at the Butterfly Room, a smallish conference venue near the Lismore Square. We offered afternoon tea and chat in the garden from 4.30pm and then the prayers for peace inside the hall from 5pm to 6pm.

We hoped that everyone would bring a peace prayer or song from their religion, and in case they hadn't, we had some from various religions ready to hand out. Three musicians came – 2 guitars and a keyboard, and the prayers included some musical ones for variety – Jewish and Baha'i songs and middle-eastern chants.

We felt that the event had gone very well, and plan to repeat it every two months – 4:30pm Saturday 7th November and then mid-January, when World Religion Day falls on the 17th. Dates and details from Judith Light on 6624 1926.

Baha'i children's classes

These continue in seven local State schools - Dunoon, Coffee primary Camp, Barkers Vale, Larnook, Lismore South. Albert Park and Bexhill. There are also two neighbourhood Baha'i children's classes after school, in Lismore and Goonellabah.

The main Baha'i class project in most schools at the beginning of this term is making Thank-you Teacher cards, ready for our Teacher Appreciation Day.

At one school the students in the Baha'i class are doing something extra this year. They're preparing a fifteen minute play which will be presented at a School Assembly during this term. It's entitled 'Good King Wenceslas', and highlights the virtues displayed by each character in the well-known Christmas Carol.

Baha'i Holy Days next month

Baha'is are taught that when we get too far off the track, God sends us a new extra Messenger to found a new religion that will spread an updated message, tailored for that era. Each new religion has its own Holy Days – Christians celebrate Jesus' birth at Christmas and His death at Easter, and the Baha'is will be celebrating two Birthdays next month.

The Baha'i Faith grew out of the previous very similar Babi Faith, which was launched in Persia (now Iran) in 1844 by the Messenger from God that Baha'is call the Bab ("the Gate" in Persian.)

We celebrate His birthday on Nov. 13 and this year the NSW north-coast Baha'is (Kyogle to Casino to Ballina to South Tweed) will gather for a commemoration hosted by the Ballina Baha'is.

The following day we'll celebrate the birth of the "greater prophet" that the Bab foretold – our Founder whom we call Baha'u'llah. The Byron Baha'is will host prayers, children's games and a picnic lunch at Broken Head.



CLUNES GIRL GUIDES WITH HELEN HARGREAVES

uring Term 3 the Guide Unit's Outdoor activities included a day at Rocky Creek Dam, where they did lots of activities for the Nature badge, World Water Week and National Tree Day. They learned how to tell the age of a tree, where water in our dam comes from and what happens to it. They tip-toed down the platypus walk but the platypus kept out of sight. They found lots of interesting leaf shapes, seed pods and flowers, insects and fungi of many kinds including one which looks like something from outer space and smells of rotting meat in its attempts to lure insects!

In September the girls participated in a day of archery, games and a walk in the rainforest, followed by a campfire, at Booyong. It was a great day and the girls made good progress with their archery skills. Some of the girls camped at our Northern Rivers Campsite in August. It was a very small camp but the girls had

One aspect of Girl Guides is taking part in new and varied activities. We also aim to encourage the girls to challenge themselves. Water badge – we looked at the dangers of water, and we went swimming. Candle badge – we learned how to light a candle safely and cook a marshmallow over it. Animal tracks badge – Each girl found out about an endangered animal and did a short presentation.



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RURAL FIRE SERVICE NEWS WITH ROSS McDOUGALL



FIRE PERMITS ARE NOW REQUIRED

he Bush Fire Danger Period was declared on the 1st September. It is now illegal

to light any fire out in the open without a Fire Permit. This applies until 31st March 2016 unless favourable weather conditions dictate otherwise.

Permit Officers for your area are listed on page 22. The permit holder must activate the permit by phoning 6626 6922 and notifying all neighbours at least 24 hours prior to lighting the fire. This includes neighbours that are separated from your property by a roadway, lane or watercourse.

Please read and observe all of the conditions set out on the Fire Permit. Failure to do so may result in you being issued with a fine. It is the permit holder's responsibility to be aware of the fire danger rating for the day they propose to burn. Fire permits are automatically suspended on days of very high fire danger or higher, as well as on days when a Total Fire Ban is declared. If a Total Fire Ban is declared, any fire that is still burning must be fully extinguished. Refer to the RFS website the evening before your proposed burn to confirm the fire danger rating for your area. Lismore City Council or the local media should also be able to provide this information.

Fire permits cannot be issued to anyone living within the residential area (50 km/hr zone) of a village unless residents first obtain written permission from Lismore City Council to light the fire. Cooking fires are exempt but some conditions apply. Contact the Council for more information.

You do not require a Fire Permit for a barbeque or campfire providing the cooking fire is in a permanently constructed fireplace surrounded by ground that is clear of combustible matter for at least 2 metres, OR it is a campfire surrounded by ground that is clear of combustible matter for at least 3 metres. The fire must be fully extinguished before leaving the area.

Another thing to consider for this fire season is this: Make sure that your driveway is clearly numbered for easy identification. A common problem most brigades encounter in rural areas is a lack of road numbering. It is difficult for brigates to respond to a call out promptly if it is dark and there are no clear numbers to guide us. As most RFS trucks in our area are quite large, driveways need to be at least 3 metres wide (wider on tight bends) and overhead branches need to be cleared to a height of at least 3.5 metres for easy access. Emergency vehicles not being able to enter your property is the last thing you want to deal with during a stressful situation.

Dial 000 in an emergency. Ensure that you give your name and contact phone number and tell the operator if access to your property is restricted to smaller vehicles. If possible, have someone meet the fire brigade at the entrance to your property. **Ross McDougall**

I am writing to express my sheer gratitude to both the inspirational volunteers and local people who took part in Daffodil Day this year. As an organisation, Cancer Council NSW is so unbelievably fortunate to be supported by the number and quality of volunteers who work across various aspects of the organisation, including fundraising, research, supportive services and prevention campaigns.

Daffodil Day has raised \$260,000 across Northern NSW already! This is an incredible contribution from every day people who give what they can to support a good cause. 

MEMORIES WITH CHARLES BETTERIDGE

In the last two issues of the Dunoon Gazette I wrote details of two former Japanese Commanders during the 2nd World War in the Pacific region which changed the future of many Pacific Island Nations forever after the war was over.

Numerous Pacific Islanders had never seen such equipment and so many men suddenly arriving on their island shores from nowhere with lots of cargo and from this, a type of "cargo-cult" started forming. The islanders thought that such cargo came from an island spirit up in the heavens and that this "spirit" could supply them with what ever they wanted. This was more so in the Rabaul areas and down to Kimbe and into many other villages all along the north coast, westward towards the the border of Papua New Guinea and Irian Jaya (now Indonesian territory).

Beside ship landings during WW2, a lot of cargo for Allied troops was airdropped from DC3 aircraft for they were well designed to go in low at less than a hundred feet in places to drop their cargo of ammunition, food, medical supplies etc. When native villagers saw this "Big Bird" swooping in and dropping magical stuff they thought that they could do it too.

During my many travels throughout PNG I actually came across some native village "Cult Leaders" and the problems that occurred with these cult leaders were disastrous in some cases. A cult leader would suddenly desire to hold a cult gathering to tell the villagers that a "vision" had occurred recently where a large ship or a big bird would soon arrive with cargo that he had requested. Those wanting to receive some of this cargo must pay him (the cult leader) certain amounts of money before the arrival of the cargo in a big ship or a big bird. On a given day they must all assemble at a certain place along the seashore or inland up on a nearby ridge. In such cases the number of villagers who joined with the cult leaders could at times reach from around twenty to a hundred or more, but the disastrous effects it had was that the villagers would abandon their daily living chores in the villages. This meant that essential food gardens or fishing were left unattended for up to several weeks and quite a number of children and elderly native villagers nearly starved to death. Most times the so called cargo ship or "Balus" never arrived on time, as suggested by the cult leader, who would make up excuses for the so called "late arrival" of their big cargo.

I vividly remember an incident in 1975 while I was living in Wewak. It was on a Friday morning around 10 am when several villagers from a native village about twenty kilometres out from Wewak came into my office wanting to buy a new Toyota Land Cruiser utility. I gave them all the details of prices, servicing etc and showed them the two new Land Cruiser utilities I currently had in stock. Unbeknownst to me, in amongst this group was a cult leader and he seemed to be giving the instructions for what he wanted. After giving them the price of the Landcruiser (14,500 Kina – PNG currency), they left my office and about a week later they returned with the cash in a bilum (a strong native string bag). As I started counting it I came across some Japanese Occupation Currency in the bilum from the 2nd World War consisting of a One Thousand Dollar note, a Ten Dollar note, 12 One Pound notes, 5 Ten Shilling notes, two Half Shilling notes, one Ten Cent note and a Five Cent note. (I still have all of these notes.).

I had to explain to the natives that "Man long Japan emi go pinis long taim bipo, na dispela Japan moni emi no gut tru, only moni long Niu Guinea emi tru moni nau." Translated, "All Japanese men went back to Japan a long time before and only New Guinea money (Kina) is the true money used now."





I offered them 50 Kina for all the Japanese currency and they accepted it – for they were already using the PNG currency to buy all their other goods etc.



The villagers took delivery of their new Landcruiser and I virtually heard no more from them for at least three months or more – but I was astounded at what I found out later on.

The Cult leader had planned for a big moment (several weeks after buying the Landcruiser) that would help all the villagers and that moment was to be; "A bigpela balus (plane) will land near their village soon carrying new Landcruisers and "planti kai-kai" (food) in it for all the villagers." Each villager had to pay 200 Kina to the cult leader to get a Landcruiser and to bring along with them a white painted wooden cross at least a metre tall and one larger cross also painted white. All of these were to be taken to the top of a hill near the runway to await the arrival of the plane (balus) carrying the new Landcruisers.

Like other villagers who came under the "spell" of their Cult leader, they too abandoned all village life and their many pigs and gardens, and in some cases their children too. It was left to the older village elders to help try and keep everyone alive.

The cult leader even took his new Landcruiser with him up to the site overlooking the short runway in readiness for the cargo plane to arrive. The airstrip was only meant for light aircraft and this applied to all runways servicing the many villages through-

out PNG which meant larger aircraft would just not be able to land. Somehow this cult leader said that "His bigpela balus emi olrait" (his big plane, carrying the Landcruisers, is all right to land). He also said to the villagers that the white wooden crosses they brought along with them are to be placed either side of the runway and the larger cross at the end of the runway. This they did, and waited and waited for the arrival of the "cargo plane".

As the days passed on and on, and there was no sign of the "Bikpela Balus" coming in, the villagers were becoming restless as by now they were nearly starving. Nearly all the money they had given to the cult leader seemed to have "disappeared" somewhere and by the end of the third week of waiting things were really starting to "hot-up".

The villagers were demanding their money back and before long, fights started erupting using some of the painted wooden crosses as weapons. At the end of the fourth week all hell broke loose; the villagers turned against each other, the cult leader's new Landcruiser was set alight and destroyed. They then turned on the cult leader himself and killed him with machetes and some of the wooden crosses.

The villagers soon returned to their homes and to ruined gardens and crops. This incident was reported in the PNG Parliament and a law was eventually passed some six months later banning such activities. However, even to this day I believe that there are secret meetings of this kind still being held, but in a deeper hidden way. However, a worse

scenario has since come about up in the Highlands of PNG over the past few years. This involves "witchcraft" where a number of female villagers have been accused by the men of witchcraft, dragged out of their villages and burned to death at a stake near their village. On two occasions women were burnt alive right in the middle of Mount Hagen township. The police were unable to stop the burning because they were greatly outnumbered by the male villagers armed with machetes and shot guns.

It appears now that a lot of Highlanders in PNG are going back to the early years and to what it was like then. **Charles Betteridge**

WILDLIFE INFORMATION, RESCUE AND EDUCATION SERVICE NEWS

It is the season when snakes are noticeably active. Being aware of these facts may help you if you encounter a snake.

Snakes are more defensive and territorial during the spring so giving them a wider berth is a good idea. Many people pass close to snakes every day but because snakes are so afraid of us and prefer to stay out of our way, we never notice. Snakes know where to find the food, water and shelter in their territory and learn the daily movements of the resident humans.

In reality, it is only occasionally that snakes and humans come into conflict – generally because the snake cannot make a quick exit. Never try to catch or kill a snake. Snakes are not normally aggressive; however, they will defend themselves if threatened and this is when most snakebites occur.

Snakes are protected by law and play an important role in the environment. Relocating snakes out of their territory puts them at risk of not finding water and food, and they may die trying to get back home.



Also, when you remove your resident snake, a stranger snake that does not know your movements may then move into your territory and increase the risk to you. Remember that a resident carpet python can be a benefit: it will easily keep rodents in check!

It is possible to discourage snakes by keeping your lawn neat and disposing of excessive leaf litter and other garden waste. Do not leave building materials, woodpiles or compost near the house. Snake-proof your aviaries, pet enclosures and chicken pens with 1cm square mesh wire. Check that windows and doors have secure insect screens and weather strips to close gaps at ground level. Try to train all family members to keep screen doors closed. Keep garage doors closed. Place water at your fence line to minimise the need for snakes to come near the house. Call WIRES if you have questions.

WIRES will come to the rescue if a snake is inside a house. If possible leave the snake an avenue of escape: close the room off and leave outer doors and windows open so the snake can leave when it no longer feels threatened. Call the Hotline for support. If you have a snake caught in netting, or if a snake has been in the same position for a number of days, please give us a call for advice.

WIRES is a state-wide organisation with branches all over New South Wales. There is a 1300 rescue line and a wildlife rescue mobile phone app that connect you with Sydney, great tools if you are travelling around the state and away from the Northern Rivers. However, if you live in the



Northern Rivers, or are travelling in the region, please use the local number. It connects you to your local WIRES volunteers immediately and ensures the most rapid response they can muster.

Need additional information or educational help about wildlife? Whatever your concern, our Hotline is for all calls to WIRES in the Northern Rivers.
