PANDEMANIA AND THE BEXHILL QUARRY PARKLANDS

It's worth reflecting on what-just-was: wave after wave of pandemia. Snap lockdowns and travel restrictions were for some, a form of forced minimalism. Adapting to online instead of in-face surfaced neanderthal instincts for many – the threat of actual or imagined catastrophe triggering the reptilian mind and instinctive survivalism. Shopping fights over toilet paper, price fights over real estate and yes – the heated debate over vax facts all have strong emotional drivers.

The antidote of course is to find our social focus again, re-acquaint ourselves with community activities, get out of forced hibernation and meet the real world. Take a picnic at the Rocky Creek Dam Reserve, go for a dip at the Whian Whian falls.

Also ranked up there with hidden Hinterland beauty spots is the spring fed waterhole of the old Bexhill Quarry. On any sun-drenched weekend (even in lockdown), people crowd out the banks and swim beneath 30m high cathedral like cliffs in cobalt blue waters of the lagoon.

The now Insta-famous abandoned quarry is being loved to death-trails of trash, the smell of bush toilets and the odd burnt car crime scene. A committed group

of residents, recognising the popularity and potential of the four-acre site, has drafted a visionary masterplan. The plan requires the former Bexhill Brickworks site to be released from Crown hands and turned into a public recreation reserve. Beginning with a weed and native flora survey, a collated social history of the site and an impeccably drafted landscape architect plan, the proposal has received in-principle support from Lismore City Council.

The Bexhill Quarry Parklands committee is seeking input and enthusiasm from anyone interested in this forward-thinking project. A complete makeover is envisioned – making it a public reserve and tying it in with the Northern Rivers Rail Trail corridor.

Public reserves and recreational amenity are the antidote to the various degrees of pandemia that families in particular need to recover from. Bexhill Quarry Parklands is just the visionary project that our local region needs.

WINNERS ANNOUNCED FOR FIRST KOORI MAIL INDIGENOUS ART AWARD 2021

Dunghutti artist and elder Gus Kelly has won the first Koori Mail Indigenous Art Award with his powerful drawing 'Nobody Told Me There'd Be Days Like These..' depicting the impact of colonisation throughout history to the present day.

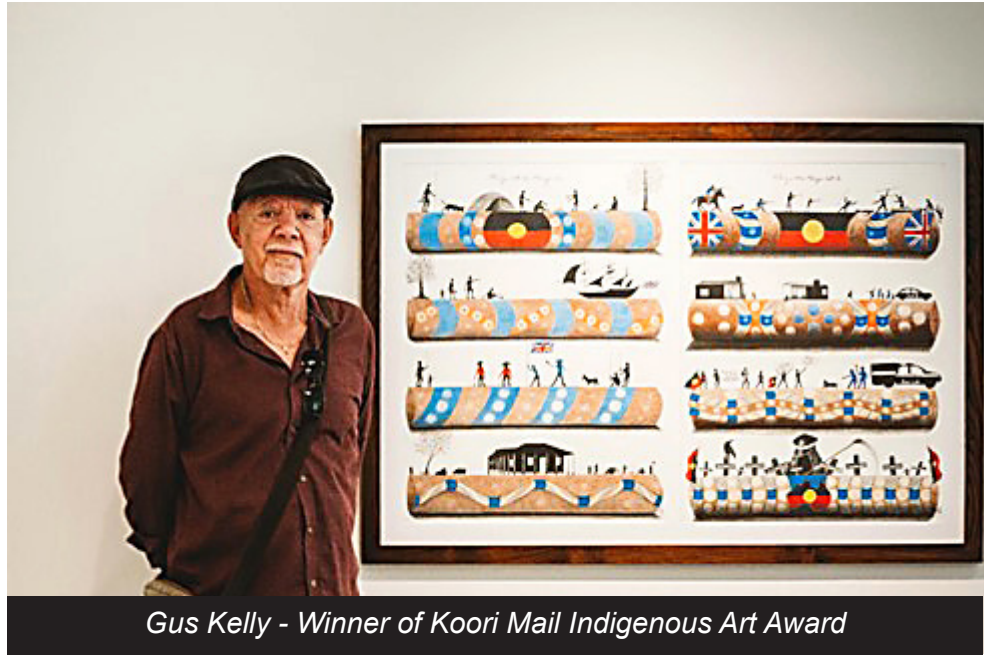
Gus Kelly says of his work:

"This is our story – our Black History. The first bar starts at the beginning – when we roamed our Country from the mountains to the sea with no obstacles. The second bar shows the coming of the Europeans in their tall ships ... The third bar is when they returned - this time to stay. The fourth bar is the squatters and homesteaders who just took our land and moved us onto missions."

"The fifth bar shows the Europeans wanting more... This is when the massacres began, killing us and moving onto our land. The sixth bar? They put us on missions and give us food rations. If they decided we weren't looking after our children, they took them away... The seventh bar is the tent embassy, the referendum, land rights, black deaths in custody; the beginning of the protests... The eighth bar is all the unmarked graves – too numerous to count – from the colonial massacres up to the present-day deaths."

"But we were here, and we are still here. Always was and Always will be."

Gus Kelly was born in Kempsey, New South Wales in 1948 and has been creating art since graduating from art studies at Kempsey TAFE College in 1997. Kelly won

the 2021 Saltwater Freshwater Aboriginal art award and has been a finalist in various awards including the Telstra National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island Art Award and Parliament of New South Wales Indigenous Art Prize.

Bundjalung artist Kylie Caldwell won the Bundjalung Art Award for her digital work 'Mrs & Mr Watcher', imagining what her ancestors would think of our modern, screen obsessed world. Kylie Caldwell is an experimental Bundjalung inter-disciplinary artist based in Lismore, NSW. The value of kinship, customs and ongoing custodianships of homelands are her core guiding principles.

Githabul artist Luke Close won the Innovation Art Award (open to Indigenous artists living in Bundjalung, Yaegl and Githabul country) for his painting 'My Journey' depicting the country he is connected to through family lines and totemic native animals including brush turkey, goanna, sea turtle and willy wagtail.

The Youth Art Award (open to Indigenous artists nationally from 12 to 24 years of age) was won by Djiru and Bundjalung artist Jahvis Loveday for his short film work

'Bama' using real captured footage of his brother and family to tell the story of a young Aboriginal boy reflecting on his fear of losing the magic of family and community after moving to the city.

The judge also Highly Commended Trawlwoolway and Palawa artist Louise Daniels for her painting 'In the Forest of the Giant Myrtle', Yiman, Gangalu and Gurreng Gurreng artist Anthony Walker for his painting 'The Pass' and Edwinea Paulson for her painting 'The Sleeping Warrior'.

The Koori Mail Indigenous Art Award is a biennial award open nationwide to all artists of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander descent, working in any medium. The award debuted this year and attracted more than 119 entries from established, mid-career, and emerging Indigenous artists from every state and territory, working across a wide variety of mediums.

DUNOON RURAL FIRE SERVICE

At the time of writing for the last Gazette edition the landscape was becoming quite dry and the fire risk was increasing.

Ironically by the time that edition hit the streets the rain had arrived and has been pretty persistent since. Whilst the outlook at the moment is for rain to continue, once the hot weather arrives and if the rain stops, long grass will quickly dry out and become a fire hazard.

Slashing long grass can mitigate that risk. Staying aware of your conditions and removing potential hazards will help prevent loss.

Dunoon brigade members meet each Wednesday, continually training to hone their skills to remain prepared when called to respond to a range of incidents.

In December, brigade members responded to 6 calls over a 4 day period, with two involving structure fires. Sadly one was an RFS

volunteer who lost their home. It is an important reminder to check to make sure your smoke alarms are in good working order.

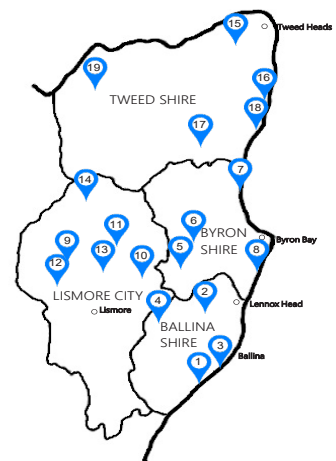

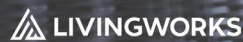

JOEY FOR KOALA MADE FAMOUS THANKS TO CHRIS HEMSWORTH

An orphaned koala who was rescued and rehabilitated by specialist vets after her mum was hit by a car has been spotted thriving in the wild with a joey of her own.

Dimples, who is about two years old, was put under the expert care of the International Fund for Animal Welfare (IFAW) sponsored vet team at Friends of the Koala in January, 2020 when she was about nine months old. Her mum died after being hit by a car in Tatham and a kind passerby found her and called the Friends of the Koala rescue hotline.

She was found to have no physical injuries and weighed a healthy 1.14 kilograms.

Due to her young age, she needed 24/7 care and was placed into home care with senior vet nurse Marley Christian. Once old enough, Dimples began spending time in the koala kindy enclosure at Friends of the Koala where she learnt important skills from other joeys that she would ordinarily have learnt from her mum.

While in care, Dimples had a brush with fame and met Australian actor Chris Hemsworth who visited Friends of the Koala while shooting a National Geographic documentary.

To prepare Dimples for life in the wild, she was transferred to a plantation kindy which is a fenced area with lots of small trees where she could practise her climbing skills, eat leaf from real trees and experience all types of weather for the first time.

The IFAW-sponsored vet team was thrilled with her progress and after a final assessment, she was released back into the wild in October 2020.

Dimples, who is often sighted near the area she was released, was recently spotted with a joey of her own.

“We are always thrilled to see koalas we have successfully hand raised or rehabilitated thriving in the wild, but seeing them contribute to the wild population is the ultimate reward – it’s why we do what we do,” Ms Christian said.

DUNOON DAM CULTURAL HERITAGE IMPACT STATEMENT

Extracts from letters to the editor

“Public opinion sure is divided about the Dunoon Dam. The issue has become one of values. For those who cherish Indigenous heritage, rainforest ecosystems, and endangered species such as koalas, then a project that destroys these things is never going to be acceptable, and will be resisted.

Social and environmental assets cannot just be ignored. They are part of triple bottom line accounting

precisely because they are crucial to our society’s well-being, and ultimately its survival.”

“It was only when Water Northern Rivers, with assistance from Traditional Owners, showed them the Executive Summary of the Cultural Heritage Impact Assessment (commissioned by Rous CC) that most councillors realised the magnitude of the impact that construction of the Dunoon Dam would have on the Traditional Owners.

It was this information which changed the attitudes of the five councillors. The information is detailed and culturally sensitive for the Wadjabul Wia-bal, and it is right that the fine details were withheld, but the Executive Summary should have been released to the councillors to inform their decision making.

The Cultural Heritage Impact Assessment has now been released on the Rous website for those who want to become informed.

When I moved to Dunoon many years ago there was hardly a tree to be seen, I could see Mt. Nardi clearly and towards Lismore with all its lights and details at night. Very few birds were noted (I admit there was no Aussie Backyard Bird count so I cannot verify that).

I think towards the end of the seventies "The Year of The Tree" was instigated and a lot of effort was made to plant as many trees as possible. The trees around the Oval testify to that, although the club had problems with trees planted too close to their building. Those of you who remember the late John Mackay with his enthusiasm, may know that he had a lot to do with the many plantings in and around Dunoon. Unfortunately, the attitude at the time was "if it's a tree, plant it" with unsuitable trees being planted. However, things righted themselves and now Dunoon is awash with trees and with the proliferation of trees came the birds, initially in small numbers until now it is bird observers' heaven

Over the past few years, the Aussie Backyard Bird count conducted by Bird life Australia in October has led me to take an active interest in bird life – admittedly I remain very ignorant of our feathered friends

However, with apologies and with mistakes here is a list of this year's observations; there is a large number of missed birds, but it is a start.

Pheasant Coucal

Lives in our garden, is very clumsy and prefers to stay on the ground, has a funny grating call.

Eastern Whipbird

A new arrival to our end of town, very hard to see as it prefers thick growth, however, its call is very loud and distinct, especially outside our window early in the morning.

Laughing Kookaburra

Except at 4.30 in the morning always welcome, the funny thing about kookaburras are the young when they are learning to laugh, but they make it.

Green Catbird

Another new arrival to our end of town, they were often heard around the shop, and probably still are. Catbirds love watching themselves in windows and are also very noisy. My concern is that they attack the image in the window and may hurt themselves; the trick, leave the blinds down so that they cannot see themselves.

Welcome Swallow

For many years the club has been and still is host to these swallows who nest in the rafters of the verandah. They do make a bit of a mess.

Eastern Koel

Well this bird flies all the way from New Guinea and for 24 hours a day in October continuously calls. I note You Tube has suggested playing a recording of his calls back to him – he does not like it and flies away. Meanwhile Mrs Koel is checking out other birds' nests to lay her eggs, and after this happens the poor adoptive parents raise the chicks and when the young Koel is old enough they take off to New Guinea with its real parent returning the following year to keep us all awake.

Australian Magpie

What can one say about our beloved Magpie. We always have a family in the back yard with the annual starving chicks demanding constant feeding.

Magpie-lark

I know this fellow as a Peewee. Not too popular Southern end of Dunoon but more active around the hall. Apparently can be quite aggressive so be careful. Likes to tap on windows a lot.

Galah

Noisy but are the locals. I reckon they arrived one year during a drought out West and have stayed and multiplied.

Noisy Miner

Dunoon's noisy vacuum cleaners, always around and very territorial, to the point that they will not allow Indian Mynas to move in.

Rainbow Lorikeet

Cheeky but colourful, always around and can become very aggressive towards other birds

Crested Pigeon

Always around, they love to dance with their lady friends.

Masked Lapwing

Noisy fellows, nests on the ground in the most obvious places, e.g. the oval and gives walkers a scare. A pair recently nested in the paddock outside my place and unfortunately foxes or carpet snakes cleaned them up despite the noisy protection of the parents – that protection goes on noisily 14 hours per day (at 4am!)

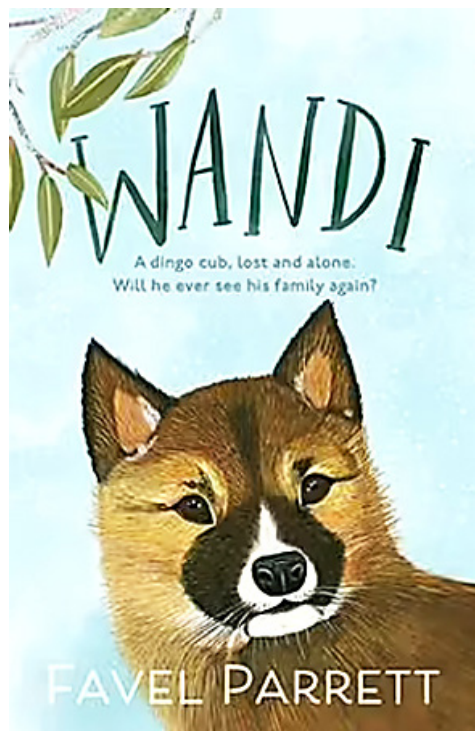

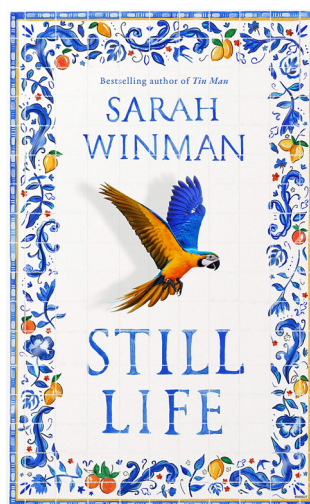

For Ulysses Temper the important moments of his life span four decades and we begin this journey with him in the Tuscan Hills of Italy in 1944 where, as a young British soldier, he meets Evelyn Skinner, nearly 64, an Art Historian and possible spy. She opens his eyes to the Italian art around them. "Beautiful art opens our eyes to the beauty of the world" she tells him. As the army moves to Florence, Ulysses discovers a city in turmoil but its underlying story captures his heart. He stops an Italian man, Arturo, from committing suicide. An act that will change his life.

Sarah Winman moves us from

Tuscan countryside and Florentine piazzas to the Stoa And Parrot Pub in London's smoggy East End. And then back to Florence when Ulysses is left an apartment by the man he saved there. He is joined by his friend from the East End, Cress and Claude, the Shakespeare-quoting Parrot. Also Peg, his ex wife has let him take her daughter, Alys, too. Here we start the sweeping journey that is filled with beauty, love, family and fate. By the end of this novel, the reader knows and understands every character in this amazing book.

There are more characters to meet. Col, the pub owner, Peg, the ex-

wife, Pete, the piano player and Evelyn Skinner whose life story is told in gripping short sequences. All these people visit Florence but Evelyn and Ulysses wait 22 years to renew their friendship. Evelyn has come to Florence to relive the memories of the time she had her heart stolen by an Italian maid. She had also encountered

E.M. Forster many years before and we get the feeling that his novel, *A Room With A View*, has joined with the characters in this wonderful life adventure. We see the enduring message of the immense power of love and friendship.

I have enjoyed Sarah Winman's previous books – *When God Was A Rabbit*, *Tin Man* and *Year Of Marvellous Ways*, but this book, *Still Life*, has connected with me in a way I didn't expect. I felt as if I was there with these people in the heart of the action. After finishing this story I craved a pasta with lashings of buttery garlic and a glass of good Tuscan Chianti. High praise indeed.

NATIONAL ASBESTOS WEEK - THINK TWICE ABOUT ASBESTOS

Think twice about asbestos, it's in 1 in 3 homes.

This year's National Asbestos Awareness Week (22-28 November) campaign asks Australians to Think Twice About Asbestos. The campaign challenges complacency by reminding home renovators and tradespeople that the danger of asbestos is far from over.

If your home was built before 1990, asbestos can still be found anywhere inside or outside the house. It was used in thousands of building materials at the time and becomes dangerous if damaged, disturbed or deteriorated.

North East Waste and member councils, Ballina, Byron, Clarence Valley, Lismore, Kyogle, Richmond Valley and Tweed Shire are working together to help reduce asbestos exposure risk across our region.

"For anyone who thinks asbestos-related diseases are a thing of the past, think again. Asbestos is still causing cancer in Australians."

North East Waste Project Coordinator, Karen Rudkin said.

Every year in Australia, there are an estimated 4,000 deaths from past exposure to asbestos. That's one of the highest death rates of asbestos-related diseases in the world.

"Whether its DIYers doing small or large jobs around the house, or

tradies on a residential worksite, the Think Twice About Asbestos campaign reminds them of the dangers of damaged, disturbed or deteriorated asbestos" Ms Rudkin said.

By preventing exposure to asbestos fibres now, asbestos-related diseases can be eliminated in the future.

"With more Australians having more time for DIY during the COVID-19 pandemic, we need to tell them how to be safe around asbestos."

"If you're considering DIY renovations or maintenance, 'Get in the know, take it slow and get a pro'. People working on homes built before 1990 can stay safe if they know where asbestos is, if they don't disturb or damage it, and if they seek professional help to locate, manage or remove it."

To 'Get in the know' all Northern Rivers councils offer subsidised 'Household Asbestos Testing' (HAT) Kits, as part of a program aimed at reducing the unsafe removal of asbestos by home renovators.

For the safe removal of up to 10 square meters of bonded asbestos only (in compliance with government guidelines), subsidised 'Household Asbestos Disposal' (HAD) Kits are also available from some council.

The National Asbestos Awareness Week campaign and Northern Rivers Councils are promoting the role of licensed asbestos professionals for both home renovators and tradespeople.

"Even tradies need to call a licensed asbestos professional if they don't have the equipment, skills, training or licence to handle asbestos." said Ms Rudkin.

“I encourage eligible local organisations to apply for the CBP 2022 round, which I’m advised will open early next year.”

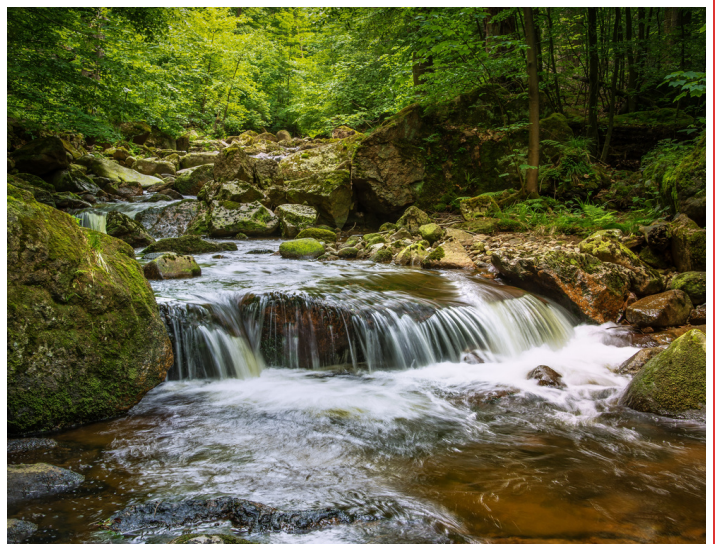

"Our farmer owners have proven time and time again that they can maintain top quality milk even when the environment is tough, so we are confident that with this upgrade we will be able to grow our ice-cream business and meet the growing consumer demand for more complex products at the right price."

The first phase of building works is currently underway and expected to be completed in the second half of next year.

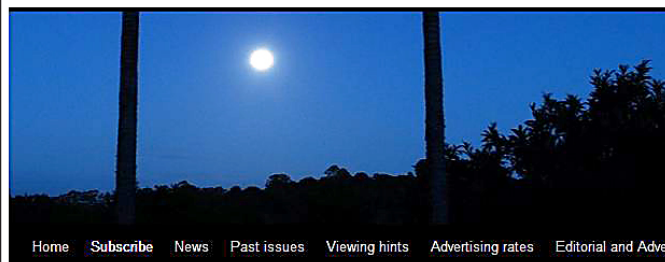
